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## The Epistle of James.

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### The Occasion.

This Epistle, perhaps the earliest of those of the New Testament, and written probably by the James mentioned in Gal. 1. 19 as "The Lord's brother," is addressed to "the twelve tribes which are of the dispersion." Its contents show that by this was intended Hebrew Christians not residing in Palestine. James calls himself "a servant of the Lord Jesus Christ," 1. 1, and assumes that those whom he addresses hold the faith of Christ, 2. 1. They are also said to be under the law of liberty, 1. 25; 2. 12. They lived in the midst of unbelievers and those who blasphemed the Name of Christ and persecuted His followers, 2. 6, 7; consequently they were, on the one hand, liable to spiritual declension, or, on the other hand, were called to suffer many afflictions from their persecutors. Most of these believers were poor; those who were rich were especially subject to the temptations of covetousness, pride, and worldliness, and were guilty of the oppression of the poor, as well as

of other sins, 2. 15, 16, and 4. 1; 5. 6. Generally there was a tendency towards a religion of words without works, of forms without feelings, a lifeless faith, a faith void of that brotherly love which should characterize it. The result was jealousy and strife, evil speaking and unkindness, pleasure seeking and ambition, and other concomitant evils.

### The Objects.

Such a condition required sharp reprimand and admonition for those who were guilty of the sins referred to, and words of cheer and encouragement to those who were suffering and oppressed. The former must be warned that pride would encounter the resistance of God; that He was a God of judgment, and would mete out retribution for oppression, 4. 6, 12; 5. 1-6 and 9. The latter must be encouraged to endure trials joyfully, and be reminded of the end of the Lord and directed to His promised return, 1. 2; 5. 7, 8, 10, 11.

The Epistle was further written to give instructions on matters more or less incidental to the foregoing, such as the character of living faith and the power of the prayer of faith, the source and nature of temptation, and the general character of religion.
